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FINN CHURCH AID FOUNDATION ANNUAL REPORT 2012

The phase of the Somalia peace process that began in 2007 came to a close in the summer of 2012. In 2007, Finn Church Aid set out to work with Somalia's religious and traditional leaders to find a settlement to the situation. Initially begun as local negotiations, the effort expanded into co-operation with the UN, where Finn Church Aid helped traditional actors in Somalia to re-establish its state institutions and complete the long transitional phase. Even though no single outside actor can take credit for this achievement, both elders and the UN in Somalia generally recognise that this positive development would not have happened without the involvement of Finn Church Aid. In Somalia, the significance of reconciliation, in particular, will be further emphasised in the future, and there is a need to support co-operation between traditional elders and the state administration.

On the other hand, the continuation and exacerbation of violence in Syria goes to show how serious the consequences of conflicts are on the lives of ordinary people. Tens of thousands of people have lost their lives and hundreds of thousands have been forced to flee their homes. In another Finn Church Aid programme area—Myanmar—there seem to be new opportunities opening up, even though a clear picture of Finn Church Aid's operations and its added value in the country have yet to be defined.

Finn Church Aid's co-operation with the UN has also found its groove. Arrangements with UNICEF to support the Global Education Cluster began to be put into action and the UN Department for Peacekeeping Operations Mediation Support Unit (MSU) requested that Finn Church Aid provide assistance to the UN Secretary General in formulating peacekeeping recommendations for later implementation.

In order to minimise the deficit for the financial period, costs were cut and fundraising measures were reevaluated. This will continue in 2013. Finn Church Aid conducted an organisational assessment, based on which permanent employment relationships were left in place, but assignment descriptions at headquarters were revised. However, fixed-term employment relationships were primarily not maintained, with savings also being sought by freezing new recruitment.

FINANCES

The deficit for the 2012 financial period was €239,248.83 (2011: €598,273.97) and the total equity at the end of the years was €5.6 million (€5.8 million). Current receivables stood at €2.4 million (€3.0 million), of which €0.5 million (€2.0 million) consisted of advances paid to partners carrying out projects. Current liabilities totalled €7.8 million (€10.8 million), comprising €3.2 million (€5.8 million) in targeted donations for disaster relief, reconstruction work and the Women's Bank, and €3.0 million (€3.6 million) in project advances received from various funding sources.

In accordance with the board's investment policies, the foundation's assets are placed in low-risk instruments, mostly money market deposits and bonds. On its balance sheet, the foundation has a small number of shares and interests received as donations, for which a depreciation of €5,245.20 (€29,799) was recorded.

Income

The income for the period was €32,847,903.14 (€30,408,080.16), representing an 8.0% increase over the previous year. The share of funding from the Evangelical Lutheran parishes was 23.7% (28.2%), including proceeds from the Common Responsibility Campaign and operational subsidies from the Church Council.

Funds from the Ministry for Foreign Affairs made up 40.2% (42.8%) of the income, while international funding sources accounted for 3.5% (3.9%) and private donors for 31.2% (24.0%).

Funds received from parishes totalled €7.8 million (€8.6 million). The parishes provided €3.9 million (€4.6 million) of funding in the form of budget contributions, €0.7 million (€0.7 million) in official collections, €0.3 million (€0.4 million) in free collections and €0.3 million (€0.2 million) in other support. A total of €1.8 million (€1.9 million) was received from the Common Responsibility Campaign, while the subsidy from the Church Council was €0.8 million (€0.7 million).

Funding from the Ministry for Foreign Affairs and Finnish and international institutional funding bodies totalled €14.4 million (€14.3 million). The Ministry for Foreign Affairs provided €7.9 million (€7.3 million) in funding for development cooperation activities and €5.3 million (€5.7 million) for humanitarian aid activities. Support from the European Union totalled €0.7 million (€0).

Income from private donors totalled €9.5 million (€6.6. million) and income from companies and organisations was €0.8 million (€0.7 million).

Interest income from the foundation's investment and financial activities were €0.2 million (€0.2 million).

Income for the financial period includes a release of targeted funds collected in previous financial periods totalling €2.7 million (-€65,000).

Expenses

Expenses for the period totalled €33,087,278.91 (€31,004,944.79), representing an increase over the previous year of 6.7%.

Expenses from aid work totalled \leq 27.5 million (\leq 25.7 million), including \leq 3.2 million (\leq 3.4 million) in project planning and monitoring expenses. The cost of aid work support functions, general administration and fundraising were \leq 5.6 million (\leq 5.3 million). Of all operating expenses, 17.0% (17.1%) was spent on support functions, general administration and fundraising, and 83.0% (82.9%) on aid activities.

Programme activities were divided regionally as follows: Africa €13.2 million (€11.6 million), Asia and the Middle East €5.3 million (€4.2 million), Latin America €3.1 million (€3.6 million) and Europe €0.8 million (€0.8 million). The expenditure on global programmes totalled €1.8 million (€2.0 million).

In programme activities, focus was directed at three strongly interrelated themes: sustainable livelihood, rights and participation, and stable societies. An all-embracing theme in the work is the promotion of sexual equality.

Salaries and remuneration, including social costs, amounted to €7.2 million (€6.3 million). During the period, €0.1 million (€0.1 million) was invested into upgrading computer systems and equipment. Depreciation on fixed assets amounted to €0.1 million (€0.2 million).

PERSONNEL

At the end of 2012, the staff numbered 131 employees (131 at the end of the previous year). 86 were employed on a permanent basis (88 employees) and 45 on temporary contracts (43 employees). Of the staff, 24 (25) worked in Finn Church Aid's field offices. In addition to employees working in Helsinki and those posted overseas from there, Finn Church Aid employed 68 locally recruited employees (56 in the previous year) at its programme offices, fulfilling a range of different functions.

During the year under review, a total of 132 man-years (116) were accumulated at the foundation. The local programme office personnel completed 62 man-years. Temporary F2F and telefundraising personnel completed a total of 5 (6) man-years.

ADMINISTRATION

The Finn Church Aid Foundation board convened six times during the year.

The board was chaired by Anni Vepsäläinen, and the ordinary members were Member of Parliament Pekka Haavisto, International Affairs Expert Tarja Kantola, Senior Work Sector Secretary Pia Kummel-Myrskog, Church Counsellor Kimmo Kääriäinen, Pastor Tapio Luoma, Ritva Ohmeroluoma (MSci), member of the European Parliament Sirpa Pietikäinen, Bishop Matti Repo (Vice-Chairman), Secretary of the Diocese Helena Tuominen, and Editor-in-Chief Merja Ylä-Anttila. The deputy members were Ilkka Mattila, Tuomas Aho and Henni Alava.

The FCA Director was Antti Pentikäinen.

FUTURE DEVELOPMENT

Finn Church Aid's long transitional phase came, in some way, to its conclusion in 2012. In its earlier strategies, Finn Church Aid made a decision to join its partners in the field, enhance its advocacy and seek to establish an international profile in its area of expertise. These choices have fundamentally changed the way the foundation operates. Even though building something new always involves challenges, the results have been encouraging.

The Finn Church Aid Board of Directors approved the new strategy for 2013-2016, which will conclude the ongoing transitional phase and set the course for foundation operations in the future. Based on the strategy, Finn Church Aid will continue to focus on three themes: the right to peace, livelihood and education. Within these themes, Finn Church Aid will find sufficiently defined, niche areas of expertise, on which a small organisation can focus its efforts, thus generating added value for its partners and achieving proven results through its own actions. Finn Church Aid will also continue to primarily work through its offices. The number of programme areas has been further reduced. Partners will be supported not only financially, but also through improving the influence and results of operations within the strategy themes.

Maintaining a presence in the field has increased Finn Church Aid's own costs. This is also why a presence in the field generates added value for partners. At the same time, assignments from headquarters should be carefully and thoughtfully transferred to offices, thus reducing the headquarters' administrative costs. Finn Church Aid has decided to seek financial growth in the future primarily through international fundraising. This requires both investments and release of funds for self-financing. These will place new demands on budget planning and the cost structure must be kept sound.

ALLOCATION OF THE DEFICIT

The deficit for the accounting period was €239,248.83, which the board decided to transfer to the surplus account for previous periods.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS OF 31/12/2012

1. ACCOUNTING PRINCIPLES

Fixed assets and depreciation

Fixed assets have been valued at their purchase price or the market value (if lower) on the balance sheet date. Planned depreciation is calculated based on the duration of financial effect assessed from the purchase price, using the straight-line method. The depreciation period for IT equipment and software is 4 years, and for machinery and equipment 5 years. Small acquisitions are entered as annual expenditure.

Allocation of income from projects

Income and expenses from projects are recorded as and when aid funds are used for their completion. Unused project funds from partners implementing Finn Church Aid projects are entered in the Finn Church Aid balance sheet as paid advances. Information about unused projects funds is based on unconfirmed financial data provided by partners.

Income and donations received for a specific purpose that are unused during the financial period are transferred for use in coming financial periods and recorded in the balance sheet under advances received or targeted donations.

Field offices

During the financial period, Finn Church Aid has maintained regional offices in Asia (Cambodia), Central Africa (Congo Democratic Republic), East and South Africa (Kenya), West Africa (Liberia), the Middle East (Jordan) and Latin America and the Caribbean (Haiti). In addition, country offices in Somalia and Southern Sudan operate under the Kenya regional office. The foreign currency revenues and expenses from these offices are consolidated into the Finn Church Aid income statement using a weighted average exchange rate. Paid advances are recorded in the balance sheet at the exchange rate of the date on which they were incurred.

Changes in accounting principles and adjustments to the previous period's financial statements

In previous years, the recovery of paid assistance has been entered under income in its own account. In 2012, recovered assistance was entered under expenses to reduce the original costs (2011: €3,270.00, 2012: €115,448.22). In previous years, the return of received assistance has been entered under expenses in its own account. In 2012, returned assistance was entered under income to reduce the original revenues (2011: €5,902.00, 2012: €10,000.00).

During the period under review, it was determined that the fund listed as a self-insured (funded) fund in previous financial periods should be listed as a self-covered fund. As a result, assets are also listed as such on the reference balance sheet.
