New Strategy Producing Results

Finn Church Aid realigned its strategy, deciding to focus its efforts on certain vulnerable countries, which are often also affected by ongoing conflicts. This has proven to be a good, if challenging, decision. The circumstances in FCA's countries of operation are similar in many ways, even though some of the nations are already starting to overcome their conflicts. Most are affected by the challenges related to building peace and a functioning state.

In countries with acute conflicts, situations change continuously and can take a quick turn for the worse, as we saw in South Sudan and the Central African Republic in late 2013. This underlines Finn Church Aid's strategic choice to focus not only on development cooperation and humanitarian aid, but also on peacebuilding through support for traditional communities. The conflicts in South Sudan and the Central African Republic have shown how quickly the results achieved through development cooperation can crumble in an unstable society without the mechanisms for quickly mediating reconciliation in worsening times.

Besides geographical concentration, the new strategy provided a division into specific central themes, which has turned out to be another good choice. The themes of peacebuilding, livelihood and education are mutually complementary. A small organisation must have the patience to contain itself to sufficiently narrow fields of operation, in order to provide genuine added value for the work of other international operators.

In its strategy, FCA also decided to focus on its existing offices to safeguard their operating conditions. These efforts are well under way, although there is still a lot left to do. Finn Church Aid's emphasis on international fundraising has started producing results; however, it also brings new difficulties in terms of project and financial management. The excellent sums achieved in private fundraising despite the tough economic times are a great achievement. Meanwhile the financial prospects of parishes look daunting.

FINANCES

Finn Church Aid made a surplus of €349,634.89 for the 2013 financial year (deficit of €239,248.83 in 2012), and equity totalled €5.9 million (€5.6 million) at the end of the year. Current receivables stood at €3.3 million (€2.4 million), of which €0.8 million (€0.5 million) consisted of advances paid to project partners. Current liabilities totalled €10.1 million (€7.8 million), of which €3.1 million (€3.2 million) consisted of targeted donations for purposes including disaster relief, reconstruction work and the Women's Bank, and €5.5 million (€3.0 million) were project advances received from various funding sources.

Income

The income for the period was €31,383,091.83 (€32,847,903.14 in 2012), representing a decline of 4.5% compared to the previous financial year. The share of funding from the Evangelical Lutheran parishes was 24.8% (23.7%), including proceeds from the Common Responsibility Campaign and operational subsidies from the Church Council. Funds from the Ministry for Foreign Affairs made up 40.8% (40.2%) of the income, while international funding sources accounted for 6.5% (3.5%) and private donors for 26.5% (31.2%).

Funds received from parishes totalled €7.8 million (€7.8 million). Additionally, FCA received €4.2 million (€3.9 million) of funding in the form of budgetary contributions from parishes, €0.7 million (€0.7 million) in official church collections, €0.2 million (€0.3 million) in voluntary collections and €0.1 million (€0.3 million) in other support. A total of €1.8 million (€1.8 million) was received from the Common Responsibility Campaign, while the subsidy from the Church Council was €0.8 million (€0.8 million).

Funding from the Ministry for Foreign Affairs and from Finnish and international institutional funding bodies totalled €14.9 million (€14.4 million). The Ministry for Foreign Affairs provided €7.9 million (€7.9 million) in funding for development cooperation activities and €4.9 million (€5.3 million) for humanitarian aid activities. €0.4 million (€0.7 million) came in funding from the European Union.

Income from private individuals totalled €7.5 million (€9.5 million), and from businesses and organisations €1.0 million (€0.8 million).

Interest income from the foundation's investments and financial activities were €0.1 million (€0.2 million).

Expenses

The expenses for the financial year totalled €31,032,987.61 (€33,087,278.91 in 2012), which was 6.2% less than in the previous financial year.

Expenses from aid work totalled €25.2 million (€27.5 million), including €3.3 million (€3.2 million) in project planning and monitoring expenses. The cost of aid work support functions, general administration and fundraising was €5.9 million (€5.6 million). Of all operating expenses, 18.9% (17.0%) was spent on support functions, general administration and fundraising, and 81.1% (83.0%) on aid activities.

Programme activities were divided regionally as follows: Africa €12.3 million (€13.2 million), Asia and Middle East €4.7 million (€5.3 million), Latin America €2.7 million (€3.1 million) and Europe €0.4 million (€0.8 million). Expenditure on global programmes totalled €2.8 million (€1.8 million).

Salaries and remuneration, including social costs, amounted to €7.7 million (€7.2 million). During the period, FCA invested €0.2 million (€0.1 million) in upgrading computer systems and acquiring equipment. Depreciation on fixed assets amounted to €0.1 million (€0.1 million).

PERSONNEL

At the end of 2013, the personnel numbered 133 employees (131 at the end of the previous year). This included 91 (86) employees with permanent contracts and 42 (45) with temporary contracts. Of the staff, 35 (24) worked in Finn Church Aid's field offices. In addition to employees working in Helsinki and those posted overseas from there, FCA employed 74 (68) locally recruited employees at its regional offices, fulfilling a range of different functions.

During the year under review, a total of 121 man-years (132) were accumulated at the foundation. The locally recruited programme office personnel completed 72 (62) man-years. Temporary F2F and telefundraising personnel completed a total of 4 (5) man-years.

ADMINISTRATION

The Finn Church Aid Foundation board convened four times during the year.

The board comprised Managing Director Anni Vepsäläinen as Chairwoman, and the following ordinary members: International Affairs Expert Tarja Kantola, Senior Work Sector Secretary Pia Kummel-Myrskog (until 22 August 2013), Director Sixten Ekstrand (from 14 October 2013), Church Counsellor Kimmo Kääriäinen, Bishop Tapio Luoma (Vice-Chairman), Journalist Reetta Meriläinen, Master of Science (Econ.) Ritva Ohmeroluoma, Euro MP Sirpa Pietikäinen, Pastor Olli-Pekka Silfverhuth, Work Sector Secretary Helena Tuominen and Commercial Counsellor Kent Wilska. The deputy board members were Solicitor Tuomas Aho, General Secretary Katri Korolainen and Director Ilkka Mattila.

The FCA Director was Antti Pentikäinen.

FUTURE DEVELOPMENT

Finn Church Aid must continue to concentrate its focus on its main strategic countries of operation, and to ensure the generation of added value within its operating themes. This will require further attention on theme leadership, pilot projects and partnerships, in order to boost the work done within the themes and increase its impact. The work carried out by FCA must have both domestic and international dimensions.

Finn Church Aid's efforts will continue to be based on the charitable mission of the Church, which is to provide assistance where it is most urgently needed and where others are not helping. Our strategy gives clear guidelines for FCA to fulfil this mission in a practical and often (compared to many other aid organisations) exceptional manner. Ultimately the purpose of our operations is to reinforce people's belief in the possibility of working together to change the world together and find solutions to even the most difficult problems.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS OF 31/12/2013

1. ACCOUNTING PRINCIPLES

Fixed assets and depreciation

Planned depreciation is calculated based on the duration of financial effect assessed from the purchase price, as straight-line depreciation. The depreciation period for IT equipment and software is 4 years, and for machinery and equipment 5 years. Small acquisitions are entered as annual expenditure.

Allocation of income from projects

Income and expenses from projects are recorded as and when aid funds are used for their completion. Unused project funds from partners implementing Finn Church Aid projects are entered in the Finn Church Aid balance sheet as paid advances. Information about unused project funds is based on unaudited financial data provided by partners.

Income and donations received for a specific purpose that are unused during the financial period are transferred for use in coming financial periods and recorded in the balance sheet under advances received or targeted donations.

Regional and country offices

During the financial year, Finn Church Aid had regional offices in Asia (Cambodia), Central Africa (Democratic Republic of the Congo), Eastern and Southern Africa (Kenya), Western Africa (Liberia), the Middle East (Jordan) and Latin America and the Caribbean (Haiti). Additionally, country offices operated under the management of the Kenya regional office in Somalia, South Sudan and the Central African Republic. The income and expenses in foreign currencies from these offices are consolidated into the Finn Church Aid income statement using a weighted average exchange rate. Advances paid are entered in the balance sheet at the exchange rate of the date on which they were incurred.
